

Apartment Checklist for Foreigners in Germany

Documents Before Applying

What you should have handy when looking for a house

Document	STATUS
Copy of passport or national ID	
Residence permit (if applicable)	
Proof of income (e.g. payslips, employment contract)	
SCHUFA credit report (optional if you're new to Germany)	
Bank statements (last 3 months)	
Mietschuldenfreiheitsbescheinigung (rent debt-free certificate)	
Bürgschaft (guarantor letter, if required)	
Personal cover letter or introduction (optional but helpful)	

During Apartment Search



- Choose target neighborhoods based on budget and lifestyle
- Search on reliable platforms (WG-Gesucht, ImmoScout24, Facebook Groups, etc.)
- Filter for "Warmmiete" vs "Kaltmiete"
- Clarify what's included: furniture, internet, utilities
- Avoid listings with upfront payments before viewings
- Schedule in-person or virtual apartment tours
- Take note of room size, lighting, storage, and heating type

Before Signing the Lease (Mietvertrag)

It's always important before signing anything to know what you are getting into

ITEM	Notes	STATUS
Review lease terms (duration, notice period, deposit, etc.)		
Understand the Nebenkosten (additional monthly costs)		
Ask about responsibility for repairs and maintenance		
Confirm if SCHUFA or guarantor is needed		
Get a signed lease before transferring money		
Check for "Schönheitsreparaturen" or renovation clauses		

Move-In Day Essentials

- Do a walk-through with landlord
- Fill out the Übergabeprotokoll (hand-over checklist)
- Take photos/videos of the apartment's condition
- Collect keys and confirm number of keys received
- Note down meter readings (gas, water, electricity)

After moving in



- Register your address (Anmeldung) at the local Bürgeramt
- Set up electricity, internet, and other utilities
- □ Notify your employer/university of your new address
- Consider renter's insurance (Hausratversicherung)

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
